Paul Pryser, a noted psychologist, advises that hope is not a short-term intervention but a way of life. Optimism is the short-term intervention, that believes the world is changing for the better while hope is the belief that we have within us the ability to make the world a better place. It is the consistent belief that we can make a difference. However, hope is; like a muscle in that it has to be worked at and acknowledges our dependency on God.

Hope is born in us from infancy and is dependent on a trustful attachment to our primary caregivers as young children. It is reinforced in our lives through the belief others have in us and the encouragement we are given to do our best regardless of the outcome. The good news is that hope is catching and therefore it is necessary to remind one another to live in a hopeful manner every day. In essence it is a communal virtue.
